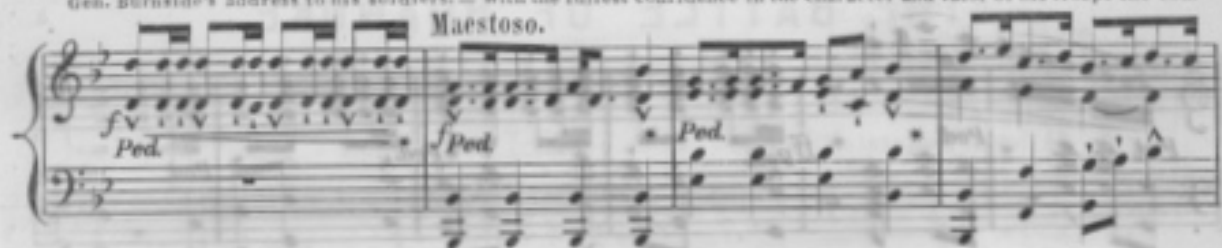

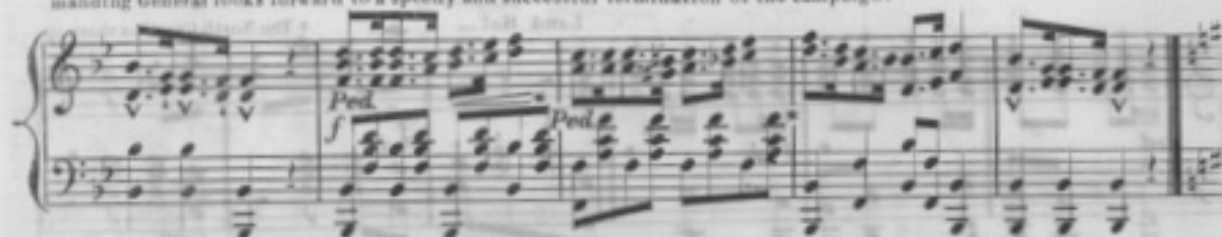

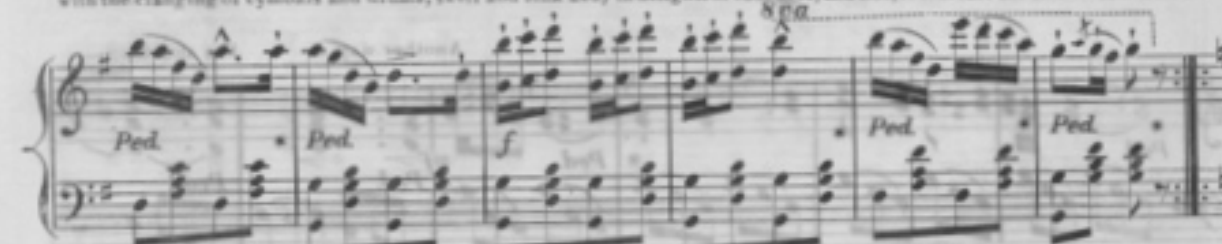
Wednesday morning. — The boatswain's whistle, calling "Away, away — heave anchor," denotes the departure.

At sundown, A GUN, from the "PICKET,"



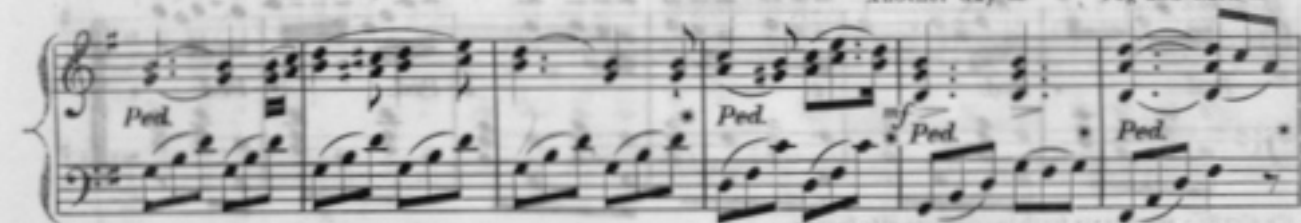

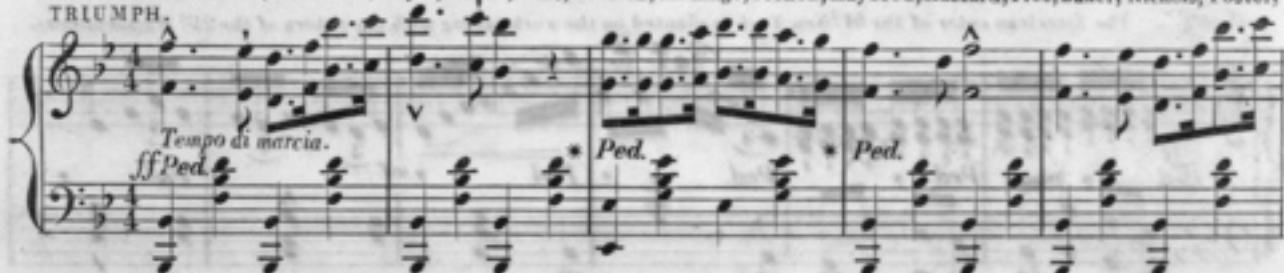
