## Preface

This score is part of the first modern edition of 6 sonatas for flute and basso continuo by Morten Ræhs (17021766) based on a manuscript kept by the Musiksammlung der Landesbibliothek Mecklenburg-Vorpommern Schwerin (Mus. 4400) titled "VI Sonate per il Flauto Traversiere ... dal Rees".

The use of accidentals in the manuscript source seems to reflect a change of practice at the time of copying. Sometimes accidental sharps, flats and naturals have been set redundantly within a bar while at other occasions in accordance with modern usage. In our modern edition the accidentals have been silently "normalized".

In the manuscript the phrasing slurs are often casually drawn. The editors have attempted to render the slurs as accurate as possible rather than trying to achieve consequence.

The scores have been typeset by Christian Mondrup with the music notation program MUP (see the Arkkra Enterprises home page http://www.arkkra.com for the note graphics and the publishing program $\mathrm{EAT}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ (see the $\mathrm{T}_{\mathrm{E}} \mathrm{X}$ Users Group home page http://www.tug.org) for frontpages, critical notes etc.
