11th. Harmony and thorough bass are briefly and clearly explained at the close of the work. The student will find that a familiarity with all the chords will enable him to progress with much greater rapidity.

12th. Modulation. As every young Pianist desires to gain some knowledge of modulation, we have given 46 examples of modulation from the key of C to every other key, both major and minor.
