In the spring of 2014, the Italian concert pianist, Alessandro Tenaglia commissioned the composer for a concert transcription of Bach's "Jesus bleibt meine Freude" (Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring). Keeping in mind that this specific Bach chorale has a deep, spiritual significance for the pianist; Manookian's aim was to respect the religious intent of the work as well as create a virtuoso concert paraphrase.

Alessandro Tenaglia spoke of the work: "*This piece is something special for me. I love its harmonies and the way it takes the listener and player in a complete circle from the charming to the sinister. What was wild transforms itself into magic like a wizard's spell. There are hints of Liszt, without its rhetorical effects, and elements of many styles forming a strong dramaturgical stream of consciousness. The harmonies and interconnected rhythms, for me, are the most impressive arguments for its originality. The composition is very masculine as a literary drama unfolds in its presentation.*"

Alessandro Tenaglia premiered this concert paraphrase on April 19, 2015 in Bolzona, Italy at the Chiesa Evangelica Luterana.
