This setting of two Irish, two Scottish and two Welsh songs was written in 1983. In preparing this new edition the opportunity has been taken to make a few minor changes to the music.

Although the piece was written for a series of concerts involving a harpsichord, a piano can equally well be used. English versions of the words of the two Welsh songs have been added, the translations being the arranger's own.

The principle changes to the music are the addition of some dynamics to the vocal and keyboard parts; some of the keyboard dynamics will be applicable only when the part is played on a piano. In *The Bonnie Earl o' Moray* the flute has been added to bars 218 to 242 to reinforce the bassoon line; originally the flute was silent in these bars. In *The Piper of Ballingorey* slurs have been added to the bassoon part in bars 352-358 and also at the end of bars 375, 377 and 379.






