


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

A homely couple had received an invitation to an ORGAN RECITAL given for the benefit of a fund at the disposal of those whose honourable mission has long been the welfare of sailormen and all "who go down to the sea in ships". The following verses— the husband's description of the visit— show that the couple were evidently impressed by the programme item, "Improvisation." The organist, somewhat opportunely happening upon a well-known hymn, based upon it a very graphic portrayal of a storm at seal.

N.B. An effective rendition demands the appropriate use of the SUSTAINING PEDAL: the accompaniment generally, to be a just-sufficiently-heard BACK-ground to the efforts of the Reciter.








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
