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Edmond Laurens received his musical training at the institution where the majority of the distinguished composers of France were graduated — the Paris Conservatory; in due time he became Professor of harmony and composition there. Among his successful stage works was a three-act pantomime entitled "The Loves of a Leaden Soldier"; he also composed a "Japanese Suite" for orchestra, and a suite "Silhouettes" for piano and orchestra. The two compositions presented here are taken from a suite for piano entitled "A Visit to the Country", twelve pleasing musical pictures of a trip through Normandy. Some of the titles are interestingly suggestive; "Invitation,"Departure", "The Brook", "Children at Play", "Moonlight" and Summer Night". Laurens' creations may be compared with those of Jules Massenet, displaying melodic charm without any considerable degree of depth.
