The Menuet and Trio from Symphony nr. 49 by Joseph Haydn is very suitable as a stand-alone piece. It is written in 5 parts, but it is best to apply diviso in parts 1, 2 and 3 (for a total of 8 players or more). The first voice represents oboe, second voice violins, third voice horn, 4 viola (and occasional also violin+viola) and bass is cello plus double base. This is a pretty easy arrangement to play.
